


DOWNTOWN WHITEHORSE PUBLIC ART MAP

Whitehorse is built on the Traditional Territories of the Ta'an Kwäch'än Council and the Kwanlin Dün First Nation. This land is home to Southern Tutchone-speaking people, whose traditions, languages and knowledge continue to shape the Yukon.

As you explore Whitehorse's public art, consider how culture, identity and history are woven into the landscape. Where are stories shaped by the land? How do cultures intersect? What can you learn by listening, connecting and being present?
